
During the afternoon Michael's voice could be heard floating around Bath as they rehearsed – how wonderful to walk around such a beautiful city and have a taster of what was in store for us that evening. The weather was perfect which complemented the two artists performing that night.

This was truly a shared concert – from the very beginning when Michael and Elaine came on stage to the strains of "One Night Only" you could tell this was going to be a very special evening. When you get two performers who are both at the top of their profession it seems to bring out the best in both of them and this is certainly what happened at Bath.

They obviously both have great respect and admiration of each other's talent. There was plenty of banter between the two of them as the show progressed which caused great hilarity amongst the audience especially when Michael departed after one of their duets and Elaine called out "Missing you already" only for Michael's voice to come back from behind the stage "I'm not far!"

Of course musical theatre had to feature very heavily in a concert with Michael and Elaine and they didn't let us down. From 'Evita' through to 'Chess' and 'Sunset Boulevard' the hits just kept on coming as it was a fantastic opportunity to highlight some of the great duets from the musicals including "I Get A Kick Out of You" and "You and I" (from 'Chess'), "The Perfect Year" (from 'Sunset Boulevard') which ended with such a long kiss we were all left feeling very envious of Elaine! Michael entertained us with (amongst others) "This Is The Moment", "Gethsemane", "Hero" (from his forthcoming "One Voice" CD), "Anthem", "Love Changes Everything" and "The Show Must Go On", while Elaine

performed most of her well-known songs including "Don't Cry For Me Argentina", "I Know Him So Well", "As If We Never Said Goodbye" and "Memory". They finished the show with the duet "The Prayer" complete with Michael singing in Italian. All in all this was a perfect way to spend a beautiful summer evening.





CRATHES CASTLE

It's been a long weekend, but so worth the effort taken for the journey and the planning. How could I not go to this, Michael's first concert in over a year? I had the time (I have lots of time) and could stretch to afford it (almost!). I'm just wondering now, what took me so long to decide to go!

It was wonderful to see Michael performing live in concert again, especially considering all his health problems from earlier this year. From the first notes sung off-stage - "I Was Born To Love You..." - it was clear his voice was in very good shape indeed!

As he always promises, the concert took us on a journey, a journey of romance, passion, drama, tears and laughter, with some dancing thrown in for good measure.

I travelled up to Scotland the day before, and met with my friend Marie, on Saturday afternoon. We had return tickets booked on a special concert bus trip, and found our way to Broad Street for the 6pm departure. By this time, the clock was ticking too slowly, and I was anxious to be at Crathes, not in the city centre. It seemed to take forever to get there: I tried to enjoy the scenery, but I just wanted to be there!

We finally arrived about 10 minutes after the gates had opened, so there were already lots of people in attendance. The setting and the weather were perfect. A warm sunny day, ending in a balmy evening, and, best of all, the midges disliked my citronella and peppermint spray. My waterproof could be put to a better use than keeping me dry: it could be a ground sheet beneath the blanket. We had a good uninterrupted view of the stage; wished we could have been closer, but it wouldn't have been practical to have arrived any earlier. Besides, the regular bus service would have dropped us a mile or more away, and I couldn't have walked that far, not on those hills. So, content with what we had, we settled back to enjoy

Two local musicians gave a 20-minute or so set. They were good, and I'd have taken more pleasure in their work if I hadn't been so eager to see Michael! After an interval, familiar faces from past concerts made their way onto the stage; a few different band members, but there was Callum McLeod to conduct, and Annie, Dean and Shena, to sing back-up. It's been a long year since the last concert, and it was good to see them all again.

As soon as Michael made his appearance, the audience was on its feet, clapping along to "I Was Born to Love You", and a surprise second song, in "One Step Out of Time". He did say he wasn't going to perform this one again: it is fun in concert, though I'm not sure it entirely works so early in the show. It's great to have an up-tempo beginning to get the audience revved up from the start, but perhaps this one belongs in party time. It will be interesting to see if Michael keeps "One Step..." in the



repertoire for the rest of the summer shows. Don't get me wrong - not a criticism - it was fun!

A change of tempo, with the lovely "When You Tell Me That You Love Me". Would that I could remember the exact order - "As If We Never Said Goodbye" was a very welcome reprise from the 2005 tour. This was a song I'd suggested would be suitable for Michael some time before, and the altered lyrics make it absolutely perfect for the context and for his voice. For the first time that evening he was able to give leash to the full power of his voice - always a thrill to hear that - and the line "I've come home at last" had added oomph, and was greeted with a great cheer. His success in America is a great pleasure to me, but I have missed him over here!

The first new number of the evening was "Hero", not one I know well, so I am particularly looking forward to this on the forthcoming CD. Michael introduced the number by saying he had planned to dedicate it to the England football team, but as they'd just lost their World Cup quarter final match, it didn't seem appropriate. Not much support for England amongst the largely Scottish audience

Whilst in New York, he had spent some time with Stephen Sondheim, and I was delighted to hear him reprise two of my favourite Sondheim numbers, "Not While I'm Around" and "Being Alive", the latter being another song I've requested of Michael several times

More concert favourites with "Walking in Memphis", and "This is the Moment", and another new song, "Home". Written by Michael Buble, this one is perfect for Michael Ball. He said he was pleased to occasionally be mistaken for Michael Buble, as he is such a great singer.

Having heard "Home" on his Radio Wales interview with Aled Jones last week, it's already a new favourite of mine, and was beautiful in concert. Difficult to be away from home and all that home means for a long time, but good to be on the road for short bursts!

I think "Music" was next. This was a terrific highlight of the 2005 tour, and I was very curious to see how it would work outdoors, in daylight, and without Lucia Macarelli. I am pleased to say, it worked fantastically well. It is such a dramatic piece, and the band were great. And who needs Lucia on violin, when you can have Michael Ball on percussion? During second non-vocal section, Michael made his way to the back of the stage, and holding up a drumstick, joined the percussion player for some thunderous pounding! Afterwards, he said "I played the drum. Do I get paid more for that?"

A fluffed line in "Empty Chairs" didn't throw him off: I suspect he's been spending most of the rehearsal time working on new material, but it is over a year since he last performed this one! He still makes it so moving, even after all these years.

"The Show Must Go On" and "Life On Mars" were very powerful, both so dramatic and perfectly displaying Michael's ability to perform rock with a very rare vocal clarity. He conveys so much meaning in everything he performs.

A change of pace with another new song to his concerts, with the Eagles' "Desperado". Michael told us that he'd had a great night out seeing the group in concert a couple of weeks before. He was really impressed with their live show, and has recorded another of their songs for his next CD.

I had removed my shoes earlier in the evening, but the slow intro to "Don't Stop Me Now" gave me warning that it was time to put them back on. Party time was here, and we were "having a Ball"! For the Queen song, "Dancing in the Dark", and a new one to Michael, "Since You've Been Gone", we were all on our feet, clapping along. I can't wait to hear how Michael has recorded this Rainbow classic. It wasn't exactly head-banging, but he was rocking!

Seated again for another change of pace and mood, we were amazed and thrilled when Michael said he'd heard "on the grapevine" that some fans wanted him to perform a piece, made famous by the King. He'd only had the opportunity to rehearse it once, so he hoped it would work. He began to sing Dixie, but a mistake was made, and he hoped we didn't mind if he started again. We didn't mind at all! He said he would only sing it if he could get it right, and he did. When "The American Trilogy" was discussed on the Forum recently, I wondered if it wouldn't be a bit of a holy cow. It is very American, obviously, and Elvis had made it very famous. All my doubts have vanished, having heard Michael sing this. Like Elvis, he has those warm tones, and the ability to move quickly and easily between an intimate voice and great expressive power. It was fabulous. If you've ever sat on the grass for a concert before, and you're not as young as you wish you were, you'll know it's not so easy to give a standing ovation as it is when you're in a theatre. But he got a muchdeserved standing ovation for this!

Staying on our feet for the finale, we were treated to "The Wonder of You", another Elvis Presley number that Michael has managed to make his own. We knew it wasn't really the last number, as "Love Changes Everything" could not be omitted. He was just teasing, and returned to the stage for that, and the last number of the night, "You Raise Me Up", which he dedicated to all of us present. "You" in the song could be a love, a spiritual entity, or an audience, lifting the performer. After all the powerful notes hit throughout the night, after all the midges, and the up-tempo numbers, Michael's voice came through in those honey smooth tones that just go right through you. How does he do that?

In fact I did a private show for the Red Cross and they had Ian Carr and Camilla Dalrymple there and she took me through my paces a bit and I really enjoyed it but it will be a guilty pleasure that I may not share. But if the show came up that required it of course I would do it – or have a stunt double!

Question: I live in South Florida, but would travel anywhere in the US to see you. You are the best singer ever! Will you be coming to the US anytime soon?

Not to perform at the moment, I have no plans at the moment to come and perform but of course I want to and we're looking at doing some concerts there next year.

Question: Is it just a rumour, or is Andrew Lloyd Weber really working on a movie version of Aspects of Love?

Question: You are an amazing performer all around. I am aspiring to be an actor as well. Do you have any advice for me and others pursuing this career?

The only advice I can give anybody wanting to pursue a career in this business is - first of all develop a very thick skin, second work as hard as you can and do as much as you can in as many different fields as you can. And watch as much as you can, you learn so much from watching other people perform. That's certainly what I did, and get as much experience as possible on stage, even amateur dramatics, putting on stuff with your friends, doing workshops, going to classes, whatever, and be prepared to face rejection because it happens to all of us whatever stage we are at in our careers, but when it works there is no better job in the world. It isn't a job it's a joy, so go for your dreams always, even if they turn into nightmares (laugh)

Question: In some of your recordings, I can detect a really sincere Country & Western feel - and it's gorgeous. Would you ever consider doing a Country & Western album?

Well I did an album called 'This Time It's Personal' which had a lot of country and western kind of songs on it, and on a number of other albums there have been little nudges towards it. I love that kind of music - I make no bones about it. There's a great synergy - they're looking at each other because they don't know how to spell it! (laughter) (flipping cheek! G & M) - between doing musical theatre and country because they are songs that are story songs, they are lyrical songs, they are songs from the heart, they tackle big emotions just as musical theatre songs do, and they usually have great great melodies and great arrangements. I 'm a big big fan of country and western, so well spotted, yes I do lean towards that in quite a number of the vocal performances I do and will continue to do so.

Question: Michael, I have seen you in concert and I think you have the most amazing voice. I've actually sung American Trilogy, not for years and years and it is the most phenomenal piece of music, so maybe you've put a good idea in my head, maybe I'll revisit it at some point, it's quite nerve wracking though when you try and sing a song that's been done so definitely as American Trilogy has, but if enough people would like it and wouldn't take the mickey out of me for doing it then maybe I'll give it a go (laugh). But I have sung it and yeah I'm a huge Elvis fan, I think he has a superb voice and great taste in songs, I'm a real fan of the latter stuff as well, the 60s and 70s, I like Vegas Elvis I really do, from the comeback onwards, If I Can Dream, and all of those great songs.


Name: Amaria Spivey

Question: I love to sing and I've never had any training, but I've heard that you haven't either. What do you do to keep your voice so wonderful? I've always been told to do vocal warm-ups before a performance, but I also heard that you don't know any. So, what do you do right before a performance? Is there some sort of a routine you always do? Thank you, I hope you are both doing well. You're amazing!

Well, I haven't had training, that's absolutely true but I do do vocal warm ups. I think it's very important to do that, you can't just walk on to a stage cold and do it, even if it's just sitting around in the dressing room while you're getting your clothes and your make up on, humming and stretching your voice.

The vocal chords are a muscle and you have to limber them up. If you're going to do a race you have to stretch your body out, if you're gong to do a concert, you have to be warmed up. You kind of find that the more you use your voice the stronger it becomes, and the more you do a concert tour for example, you get what we call your "chops" which is your voice and body get used to singing the songs you are singing so it doesn't require as much effort as when you are first hearing it and first learning it.

I would advocate if you are starting doing it there's no harm in having singing lessons as long as you hold on to your personality, if you don't it becomes all about technique because singing is all about your heart not your head, especially if you are singing contemporary musical and pop songs. It's a whole different matter when it comes to opera and classical music. Yeah you have to take care of yourself. We're all human. We all lose our voices, we all get colds, we all get tired and a lot of the time you can push through that and work through that. There are times for all of us when we can't, but you can't abuse yourself too much when you're working hard, and yes, always warm up, that's my advice.



I don't know why, but when I haven't seen Michael for ages I tend to go "off the boil" to some extent. I don't mean I go off him — I play his records throughout the year and I am still very interested in his career and visit the forum to see what's going on pretty much every day.

However, I always seem to forget over the course of several months just how brilliant a performer he is when he is on stage. It's over a year since I saw him last (Hammersmith, June 2005) so when I set off from Yorkshire to Hampshire last Thursday morning my only thoughts were "Oh, no! All that way and in this heat too!"

I always seem to forget how much it's all worth it (though obviously never enough to stop me from booking!)

Well, it was a long hot journey all right and all I wanted to do when we got to our hotel was not to visit the undoubted delights of the beautiful

Hampshire countryside but to have a lie-down on the bed! (An air conditioned room – what bliss.)

I had gone for one of the £85 tickets. Although the idea of the higher priced hospitality tickets is somewhat controversial, I had decided that the idea of not having to queue or run, together with a "welcome" drink, a buffet and an allocated seat sounded like good value for money.

It was too. Not only was it very pleasant to have a table in the marquee where you could chat in comfort to other guests, but the meal itself was excellent and the service was extremely good. I won't be able to afford that every time but, if I am able to, then I would do it again. It was lovely to meet up with friends and I spent a very pleasant hour or so before the concert.

I was very fortunate in getting a decent seat at the end of a line. Being 4'11" tall this is always a very welcome

bonus! Normally I take my seat and then watch out for the 6'9" giant coming in. That's them I think. The one that's going to sit in front of me!

The seating was rather amateurish I have to say – a bit like a school assembly, with no tiered or raised chairs. I noticed some people deserted their seats to sit on the raised grassy banks at the side. Thankfully I had no such problems and I had a perfect view but I did feel for those I met later who had had some trouble in seeing.

Julian Lloyd Webber was really good as of course you would expect. My husband particularly enjoyed the performance as he loves cello music. I don't know why but I had always thought Julian seemed a bit po-faced but in fact he was nice and smiley with a good sense of humour.

As soon as Michael came on then of course I always know straightaway why I travel several hundred miles to see him. He looked just wonderful in his white suit. He also was looking very trim and fit and I'm pleased to say is hanging on very well to his youthful good looks! His hair was gorgeous. I am just such a sucker for all those curls! When Michael has his hair all chopped off I always feel like going and giving his hairdresser a good talking to! ("DO YOU KNOW THE DISSERVICE YOU HAVE JUST DONE TO WOMANKIND?")

OK – white suit, lots of curls, gorgeous looking, what else is there to say?

Oh, right, the songs! Well, I'll leave it to others to list the songs as I am hopeless at remembering. I never take any photos and I never write any songs down – I am always too busy enjoying myself! It's just as well that other more organised fans take all the details and take such lovely photos.

I know he sang many of my favourites ("Walking in Memphis", "This is the Moment", "When You Tell Me That You Love Me", "As If We Never Said Goodbye") and also treated us to some new songs too. If the new songs he introduced to us ("Hero" and "Home") are an indication of the quality of the new album in October,

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then we are really in for a treat. I also loved "The Show Must Go On" and "Life on Mars". "Music" was also fabulously done and really dramatic. Great stuff.

One of my favourite sections was when Julian accompanied Michael to "Unexpected Song" - it's a beautiful understated song. Michael did very well to recover his composure after teasing some poor unfortunate who picked the absolute wrong moment to walk in front of the stage! "I" sang Michael. Lady runs back from the loo. I thought she handled it very well as she curtsied to him when she got back to her line of seats! He was sort of cross/amused. Off he went again "I have never felt like this" - I am always impressed at how he recovers after being distracted. A true professional.

Towards the end of the concert Michael introduced an Elvis classic, and I could scarcely believe my luck when the opening of "An American Trilogy" started up. Everyone who knows me knows I am a lifelong Elvis fan and to hear Michael do justice to a song so strongly associated with Elvis was absolutely wonderful. Yes – worth all the travelling and the sweating!!!

Somehow I don't think I can have been the only Elvis aficionado in the audience. As soon as the song started we were "treated" to hundreds of voices joining in and it was obvious that people knew every word! I decided that if you couldn't beat them you might as well join them, so I had a good sing as well! I might be wrong, but I don't think Michael was too impressed. I think the idea of singing the song was to create a bit of dramatic thunder, which was ever so slightly lost in the general sing-along. (Perhaps if Michael makes a habit of singing the song (yes, please) he would prefer to do it in the section of the concert when everyone is sitting

If the charge to the front and "party time" were to end then I wouldn't complain. However, I don't see its demise just yet so, again, if you can't beat them, join them and just have a good time. My friend literally propelled me out of my seat and pushed me down the aisle as she was obviously not about




to be done out of getting a good view of Michael! All I could think of was that I was glad I had put my shoes back on (I had taken them off earlier and was cooling them on the grass until I thought I might be being bitten by several million mozzies.)

The atmosphere down the front was actually brilliant and although my feet were killing me by the end I really enjoyed myself! I noticed a lot of young fans down there too, which is always nice to see.

The day had come myself and fellow Lancashire Lasses had been waiting for -Michael was finally coming to perform an open-air concert at Southport Summer Classics right on our doorstep.

We went down early to Victoria Park to eagerly start queuing, and fortunately found only a handful of fans in front of us, so we duly set up camp for the day. The sun was already shining through and as the day went on it became a real scorcher, a fact we had the proof of the following day - tanned/red faces, arms, backs and fronts and white marks where straps and tops finished. The comradeship in the queue was great, all were there having a great time and eagerly meeting up with friends, catching up on news, and watching over other fans belongings whilst they went off for loo breaks and to dine throughout the day. It was wonderful to meet and talk to so many 'old' and 'new' fans whilst in the queue.

Michael arrived at Southport about

1.30pm driving himself, and as he turned around the corner to face the queue he gave a loud toot toot on his horn, to which he received a rousing cheer. I think once Michael had arrived the sense of excitement was apparent, and everyone was the eagerly awaiting Michael to start rehearsing, so we could sit back and hear the familiar sound of him singing across the park.

At 6pm on the dot the gates opened and that was the start of "the run" to get a bit of turf on which to place your chair for the night. I am so relieved that it was only a few hundred yards, but believe me when your running it feels like miles. Thanks to Clare, Joanne, Cheryl, Edith, Babs and myself who all drew the short straw to complete this "marathon", we managed to get a good area at the front in the centre. We mustn't forget though the poor "mules" who had to carry, cart, drag or use whatever other means to bring all the chairs, bags, cool bags etc - thanks to Sue, Marie, Gilly, Chris, Nick (and Bernie

later with the wine supplies) who had that task.

The Tivoli Trio were already on stage as folk poured into the park, and played a selection of songs which suited all ages, including a selection from Les Mis. It was very nice to sit and picnic listening to this Trio, and when they ended their performance at 7.45pm they received rousing applause.

By now the park was full, and we had been told over 4500 tickets had been pre sold so there was a great crowd there for Michael's concert.

The buzz was by now apparent as fans were eagerly awaiting those familiar overtures by Michaels band and to hear those first sounds from Michael. "I Was Born To Love You" could be heard as Michael started singing off stage, everyone started clapping, and when Michael came through the backdrop everyone was on their feet clapping and



dancing along to the first song of the night. Michael was wearing his familiar white suit, white shoes and pale blue shirt and looked stunning stood there in the spot and sun light. He went straight on to sing "One Step Out Of Time" where everyone joined in with the arm punches, and we all knew it was the start of another SIZZLING CONCERT.

Michael then spoke to say how pleased he was to be up in the North again, especially Southport, making remarks of "posh" Southport.

My personal favourite "When You Tell Me That You Love Me" was the next song to be given the wonderful Michael treatment; I will never tire of Michael performing this one. "As If We Never Said Goodbye" followed with Michael giving us some very convincing facial expressions, showing his acting skills creeping in.

Before Michael performed "Hero" he made comment on past troubles, and said it had very poignant meanings for some people. This is fast becoming another favourite of mine.

Michael then spoke a little about Sondheim, and then said he could see a man in the crowd with a baby and the next two songs - the first could be what he sang to his baby and the next he said with a sigh, could be to his wife. After singing "Not While I'm Around" and "Being Alive" you could see Michael look over at the man and acknowledge him, a very moving touch I think.

Two more favourite songs were then sung - "Walking In Memphis" and the show stopping "This Is The Moment", which gave rise to the well deserved standing ovation from the whole crowd, and I mean whole, as I did look back and see the whole audience on their feet.

Home was next performed, after Michael had said it was a very meaningful song to those artiste who when they performed away from home still had a longing and a thought of back home.

Michael then spoke of how the next song could sum up entertainers, and tongue in cheek said except for Dean (obviously a joke between them). The now familiar chords of "Music" were then heard, and Michael then entertained us all with a show stopping performance of this mind-blowing song. Whilst the instrumental part of this song was on Michael could be seen standing half way up the centre steps, with his back to the audience, moving in rhythm to every note. It was then indulgence time for Michael when he went to the top of the steps, took the large drum sticks in his hand, held them aloft grinning greatly, before turning to the drums and beating away with the music, and adding the extra crash of the cymbals in. Once again the audience were stood on their feet, clapping and cheering and giving another well-deserved ovation.

After a short intermission Michael came back on stage in a dark suit, white shirt and sparkly tie to give us his own version of "Evita", which is always a popular song for me and for audiences. The recognisable tune of "On The Barricades" began and Michael perched on his stool to sing a very moving "Empty Chairs, Empty Tables", this seems to be another of Michael's "own" songs.

"Life On Mars" a very popular song since Michael first sang it in Alone Together brought rapturous applause for him.

Another personal favourite was next to be given the Michael treatment - "Any Dream Will Do" and one that Michael encouraged the audience to sing along with him.

Michael then began to talk of quality groups and of one that was a particular favourite of his, and of him going to see their 'last' show (not really their last show though he said they kept saying that). He then made comment that he too would make it HIS last show tonight, to which you can imagine he got what he wanted to hear, cries of NO. Michael said it was The Eagles and received loud cheers as he introduced his next song "Desperado".

Queen's number "The Show Must Go On" then followed, and I feel his rendition of this song though different from Queen's is one that is popular and pleasing to all Michael fans.

It was then time for a very popular and a very cheeky 'party time' to begin with Michael belting out "Don't Stop Me Now", and there was no stopping him he was certainly 'having a ball'. "Dancing In The Dark", and by now it was dark was next, everyone was on their feet, as far back as I could see the audience were stood up enjoying the party atmosphere. Before the next song Michael and backing singers adopted the upright stance, with arms folded up aloft, and Michael said they were going to bring culture to the night seeing as they were in posh Southport. The music struck up and the rock number "Since You've Been Gone" was belted out, much to the audiences enjoyment. A very moving "The Wonder Of You" followed, and again had the audience swaying along to it. An old favourite and a very popular one came back in to the concert, a somewhat cheeky version of "Help Yourself", and Michael did not disappoint he was 'hot' and very 'cheeky'.

Michael spoke of 'The King' and how he had heard rumours a while back of fans wanting him to perform the next trilogy of songs. What followed was an amazing rendition of the famous "American Trilogy" and what applause he received for his wonderful version of this collection of songs.

At this stage Michael took his earpieces out and encouraged the audience to sing this one with him, which seems to have become the norm of late. 
This is Amy, daughter of fan club member Emma Barker. Isn't she gorgeous? Is she Michael's youngest fan at 6 months old?
