

A FANTASTIC 'MICHAEL' YEAR!

What a fantastic "Michael" year 2011 has been for me!!

First of all on 31st March I went to the recording of Fern Britton's show because Michael was one of her guests.

Then there was the "Heroes Tour" in June, I went to six of Michael's concerts. As it was my 60th birthday in March I was lucky that three of them were "Meet and Greets" - what a wonderful few weeks I had!

At the end of September, Alastair and I went to Portsmouth for a long weekend to see Michael in Sweeney Todd at the Festival Theatre, Chichester. We saw Sweeney on Friday 30th September, we had really good seats in the second row. I did not know much about the story except that it was going to be dark and gruesome, little did I realize how grisly it was going to be!! When Sweeney Todd (Michael) came on stage you could hardly recognize him until he started to sing! Michael had a black beard and a wig of flat, straight hair, his make-up was dark, especially round his eyes. Sweeney Todd the barber had been deported for 15 years and while he was away, Judge Turpin had become his daughter Johanna's guardian and he thought that his wife, Lucy, had died. Sweeney was determined to get revenge, he moved in above Mrs Lovett's pie shop. Between them they decided to get rid of all the bad people. Sweeney slit their throats when they came to him for a shave, then Mrs Lovett ground up their bodies and cooked them in pies which she sold to the unsuspecting public with a pint of

The first victim was an "Italian" barber who recognized Sweeney from before he was deported. Mrs Lovett then looked after his young assistant Tobias. Then a seaman called Anthony fell in love with Johanna and they were going to run away together but the Judge found out and locked her in an asylum. Throughout the show there was a woman around who appeared really old... Anthony rescued Johanna and took her to Sweeney's where she hid in a

trunk. Meanwhile the old woman came to see Sweeney - he promptly killed her then eventually slit the Judges throat. Tobias realizes what Sweeney and Mrs Lovett were doing and cornered Sweeney downstairs near the furnace where the pies were cooked. Sweeney had discovered that the "old woman" he had killed was his wife Lucy and that Mrs Lovett knew all along that she was still alive so he pushed her into the furnace and was cuddling Lucy when Tobias found him. Tobias then slit Sweeney's throat. By the end of the show nearly everyone was dead except Johanna and Anthony.

I didn't realize that Michael was going to die but what I like about "live" performances is that you see everyone "alive" when they take their bows!

Alastair and I then went to the stage door along with everyone else to congratulate Michael.

The next morning we got up early and went by hovercraft to the Isle of Wight for the day. As we hadn't had breakfast we wanted a cup of coffee before going to Seaview Flamingo Park. As we were looking for a cafe in Ryde the first sign we saw was outside a pub,

it said "Thursday's pie and a pint £6.99" then we actually had our coffee in a cafe next door to a proper barbers with a pole. We couldn't believe it - we haven't seen a barber's with a pole for years, most hairdressers are unisex these days - especially after just seeing "Sweeney Todd"!

I then met up with Diane and it was nice to see her and chat again. She told me that she had seen him in the afternoon when he arrived and our poor baby is suffering with a sore throat! She then asked me if I had looked in the programme to see if he was going to be in it this evening. I then had a sense of dread and a heart stopping moment

because I didn't want to have travelled all this way then find out Michael wasn't in it due to illness! I mean, I understand and am sympathetic, we all can't be perfect and well all the time - just the excitement at seeing it with Michael, I'm sure you understand what I mean! But he was in it and all was well again!

After going to the rest room I went to find my seat and it was a good seat though I know why it said restricted view, when Todd's platform is pushed right back for the opening and he's sat in the chair, you can't see it! But that was only a few scenes so didn't miss very much.

At 7:30pm the lights dimmed and the show started with the opener and 'No Place Like London'. Act one closed with 'A Little Priest' and the highlight had to be the look on Michael's face when he finally followed Mrs. Lovett's lead at the start of the song then near the end where he said that he preferred General and Mrs. Lovett asks, 'With or without his privates... With is extra!" Naturally a fun and amusing number despite being morbid.

Then there was an interval of 20 minutes. The show restarted with 'God! That's Good', but as the second half took off you could hear that Michael was suffering - I noticed it more in the 'Reprise of Johanna' but by no means was it awful and neither did it dampen my enjoyment, my heart just went out to him because I felt he must be suffering!

When the second half closed and he came out to take a bow the whole theatre whooped, cheered and gave him a standing ovation, it was really touching. And yes I am very proud to say I was amongst them too. As soon as he left the stage I got out as quickly as I could to get to the stage door. I happened to be one of the first ones there though not for long as more people began to gather and this was where I met back up with Diane. After awhile Michael appeared with Andrew and he was courteous enough to sign autographs and pose for photos, and I told him I was sorry he was ill. After briefly meeting Claudia from the fanclub I said my goodbyes then called the taxi to take me back to the hotel. A truly wonderful evening, topped off with wonderful Michael another truly memory.

The Sweeney Todd Q & A Session

On 13 October, members of the cast came on stage at the end of the show for a Q and A session. Julia and Kerstin were there and this is their blog...

The cast appeared on stage to huge applause (so many of them were so kind to spend a little while longer with us). When Michael came on stage the substantial crowd erupted into massive cheers. He did look rather delicious in purple shirt and jeans (no socks... mmm!). We were allowed to ask questions then. There were many good questions from the audience. Imelda had brought her cute little dog ("This is Molly with her carer," introduced Mr Ball!).

Were they inspired by the movie? Er, no, not really, did it look like it? The idea to set it in more modern times was to make it more relatable for a modern audience and also to shake off all the ghosts of past productions - or indeed the movie. They had an incredibly short rehearsal period of 5 weeks to get to this perfection (Michael and Imelda had rehearsed an extra week together before this).

There were many young actors in the audience who wanted advice on auditions and getting into character. They received really insightful replies by Imelda and all the others.

Did they know they had a hit when still in rehearsals? You could tell they all thought yes, they did really, but didn't want to sound too self-absorbed so went for the reply that they knew it when they had the audience in for



the first time.

There was a quite daring question asked about the temperamental chute (some victims were rather hesitant to slide down into the bakehouse). They explained how the blood is based on sugar and is a very sticky affair. So at one point, when one poor victim was indeed stuck in the middle (we had seen this show) Michael told us all how eventually a hand came up from below and pulled the actor down and

out of sight. And he had to remain singing throughout the entire drama! Mind you, as we said, we had been present at the incident and you couldn't see the tiniest hint of a flicker of irritation on his face or hear it in his voice. That's an example of a true professional for you.

There was another question regarding the blood flow during the "killings". Sometimes you hardly see a drop and at other times it's

splashing around like a broken water pipe. The guy who plays Sweeney's first nameless victim explained the situation. When they started rehearsing with the blood they all had belts that made them look like suicide bombers, including blood pouches and battery packs and so on. They needed to push a button and the blood was supposed squirt. At the beginning it merely trickled and then exploded into Michael's face. Now they do this mechanically in a way. Actually he did completely reply to this question.

There was lots of praise on stage and off stage for the actors, the musical direction, the sound design and the set. explained Michael important the sound design was for the show as they did not use the existing system of the Festival Theatre, but had something individually designed installed. It's rather complicated but there seem to be a series of many small speakers that are individually controlled.

Then he continued to talk about the emotional impact of the opening scene, when he is still hidden from view and hears the almost operation intro from the ensemble. He said the soundwaves hit you and what an amazing moment it is, when the entire cast calls out to him ("Sweeney, Sweeney...!"). So, if we ever get the chance... This earned him a big laugh. As if they'd ever give us the chance to sit on that chair in turn... We wish!

It was over all too soon, but they had all been very generous with their spare time.







This was my second visit to see Sweeney Todd and I had a "ball" as I had a front row seat and met my friends who were also in the same row Debbie, Susan and her friend Shannon. It was a lovely surprise to be sat altogether as I have not seen Debbie for ages. It was a thrilling evening and I thought the show had just got better and better. The icing on my Birthday cake was this lovely photo with Michael and having a cuddle! A birthday I will always remember with my friends Debbie, Susan and Shannon who comes from the U.S.A. Thank you Michael and "girls" for making my day so special.

On 2nd November we attended the Chichester Theatre Members Annual Luncheon where Michael was the guest speaker. Michael arrived with Jonathan Church who is the Artistic Director. Michael's talk was in the form of a Q & A session for the members. Below is a synopsis of those questions and Michael's responses.

Q. How did you come to do Sweeney Todd?

A. Stephen Sondheim invited me to attend a performance of Sweeney Todd when I was on Broadway, doing Woman In White, 6 years ago. I knew the music but had never been a huge fan of the show itself, but having seen it; I thought it was the most extraordinary piece of musical theatre ever. I dreamt of it being done in England with a large company and full orchestration. After Cathy had seen the production, and she is not a Sondheim fan (I'm not going to tell him that!) she said 'I can see you playing Sweeney Todd'. And that was when I started to think seriously about doing the show at some stage.

A few years later I was having the time of my life wearing a dress and being Edna. However I knew the next show, after *Hairspray*, would have to be

entirely different, so my thoughts turned to Sweeney Todd which would be very special and totally unexpected.

Imelda Staunton was a guest on my Radio 2 Sunday Brunch Show and it struck me that she would be my perfect Mrs. Lovett. I started making plans and knew that Chichester was where I would like Sweeney Todd to be staged initially. I spoke with Jonathan Church who was favourable to the idea. And here we are now with a wonderful company and great reviews, topped by Stephen Sondheim loving the production. I couldn't be more happy and proud of this utterly, utterly golden moment I have had in Chichester.

Q. When are you bringing out the CD?

A. Soon I hope, but I have others you can buy in the meantime!

Q. My grand-daughters have seen the show and said you (Michael) were amazing but too good....they had nightmares!

A. Michael was very amused!

Q. How have children responded to Sweeney Todd?

A. This is a true story. Our Musical

Director, Nick, bought his three kids in yesterday aged 8, 9, and 11. He wanted them to come back stage, see the razors and to know how the throats were slit so they wouldn't be scared during the performance. I didn't have my fake razor with me, so showed them a proper razor, over 100 years old, that one of the fans had kindly given me. I demonstrated how to use it on their Dad's hand. Unfortunately I managed to cut his thumb in process....

During this response from Michael a lady, sitting on a table quite close to him, fainted. Michael took control of the situation and after ensuring she was being well cared for, he suggested we all move to the Minerva Theatre next door to continue.

End of answer.....The Dad then went to make-up and had fake stitches put in!

Q. Are you taking the show to London?

A. I'm really rubbish at keeping a secret! I am not allowed to disclose anything, but if I were a betting man, I think the signs are YES. Will you not put this on the internet; can we keep it between ourselves? This must be the worst kept secret in the history of



musical theatre! We are looking at the Adelphi Theatre in March. I think there will be a leak tomorrow.

Q. Imelda as well?

A. Oh no, I can't bear her, no! (Michael laughs) Seriously, I couldn't bear to do it without her.

Q. Is it a limited run?

A. Yes, a limited run with two weeks off for the Olympics. Apparently I am doing the long jump!

Q. Did Alfie Boe approach you to sing 'Empty Chairs, Empty Tables' with him on his new album?

A. He most certainly did. We first met when we were both in *Kismet (great laughter by all who had seen the production)*. It was like Carry on Camel! It was appalling but great fun. I introduced Cameron to Alfie...

At this point a mobile phone rang and Michael tells a few tales, which we have heard before, about bad behaviour in theatres. Back to Q & A's...

A. ...and suggested that Alfie could be a good candidate for Jean Valjean. I also mentioned that Alfie had joined me at 'my' Prom; and we dueted 'The Pearl Fishers'.

Q. We know that in Hairspray you got inspiration from your Gran. Are there any skeletons in your family closet to help with the inspiration for Sweeney?

A. Funny you should say that. I did a programme for BBC Wales called 'Going Home'. During the research period I related a family story about my grandfather, several times removed, being hung for smuggling... shocking! The researches discovered this was unfounded, it a was a total lie, but for 25 years the family believed it... my Gran went to her grave believing in the sordid story about her ancestor. The only scandal they uncovered was that several cousins had intermarried!

Q. Did you have any input into the set design and production of Sweeney Todd?

A. One always does. I had dinner with the producers and discussed the way ahead. It was decided that setting the show in the 30's laid the ghosts of previous productions to rest and

allowed a new audience to connect to the later time period... It took time to develop the Sweeney Todd look and several alternatives were tried and rejected. (Sweeney being bald). I had several ideas because the score said 'his skin was pale and the eye was odd' but they wouldn't allow me to have a cataract! Like *Hairspray*, people have complained that Michael Ball wasn't in the show but that his understudy was exceptional! That is the biggest compliment an actor can have.

Q. How do you relax after a show?

A. I have a small drink, eat and watch rubbish telly. Sometimes I have a drink with the guys after the show. You have to slot back into normal life because with something so intense as Sweeney you have to try to get back to normality and I am not one of those who takes the part home with me... imagine Cathy?? (Shock horror!)

Q. Normally you come to the stage door between shows when there is a matinee, but not so with Sweeney?

A. Its very intense so after the performance, although its lovely seeing people and signing autographs, that is a type of performance in itself, so I have to be quiet, get my energy back and stay in the zone. Coming to the stage door would take me out of

the Sweeney character.

Q. How did you transform yourself into this fit looking character we see before us?

A. I lost quite a bit of weight. I knew the reviews I didn't want to read were 'Michael Ball eats all the pies!' You have to be disciplined and I know that would have been said. You have to keep fit – I walk the dogs for 90 minutes a day on the beach and get plenty of fresh air. I have good food, great people to work with and it's a great show to be part of.

Q. I thought the Hairspray show was far more vibrant than the movie. Why couldn't a stage performance be filmed?

A. Due to' the rights' issue you can't just stick up a camera and film a show. That's the thing about live theatre; it's built for the audience. I have seen very few stage productions that have been filmed on stage and have worked. That's why I think the theatre is so alive and kicking and always will be, because nothing can replace it.

Jonathan Church thanked Michael and the session closed.


It was a thoroughly enjoyable occasion – good meal, good company and an exceptional guest of honour!


James Hurley was born on 21 May and had his first meeting with Michael (hopefully first of many!) at the stage door in Bristol when he was just 4 weeks old!
